Living away from home allowance (LAFHA)

The Living Away from Home Allowance (LAFHA) is an allowance for eligible Australian Apprentices who have to move away from their parents' or guardians' home to take up or retain an Australian Apprenticeship. This allowance is available to eligible full-time and part-time apprentices during the first three years of their apprenticeship. LAFHA is paid in arrears at the following rates:

• First 12-month period from the date of commencement: \$77.17 per week

• Second 12-month period: \$38.59 per week

Third 12-month period: \$25.00 per week

The following are the April 2025 Australian Labour Market trends:

- unemployment rate remained at 4.1%.
- participation rate remained at 67.0%.
- employment increased to 14,622,100.
- employment to population ratio remained at 64.3%.
- underemployment rate increased to 6.0%.
- monthly hours worked decreased to 1,967 million.

Busting VET myths

The 2017 Perceptions are Not Reality report from Skills Australia debunked some of the most common misconceptions about vocational education and training in Australia.

MYTH: Almost 30 per cent of Australians believe that university graduates find work more easily than VET graduates.

FACT: VET graduates have a higher employment rate than university graduates. The average employment rate of a VET graduate is 78 per cent (it's 69 per cent for university graduates).

MYTH: One in five Australians believe that VET graduates earn less than university graduates.

FACT: The average VET graduate actually earns similar wages to, if not more than, an average university graduate.

MYTH: Three in five Australians believe we need university education more than VET to thrive in a globally competitive world. Almost half those people think VET is no longer as relevant as university education.

FACT: VET aims to provide the skills we need to keep up with our quickly changing employment and industry trends.

Additionally VET provides courses for nine out of 10 occupations predicted to have the greatest growth of new jobs over the next five years.

The minimum selection threshold is the minimum adjusted score (ATAR/rank) that was considered for an offer of a course place in the January 2025 offer round. Minimum selection thresholds vary from year to year and from offer round to offer round, depending on the number and quality of applicants a course receives. Literacy and Numeracy requirements for Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) in 2025

To be issued a QCE, students need to gain a set amount of learning, at the set standard, in a set pattern, while meeting literacy and numeracy requirements. These requirements are aimed at ensuring students complete their senior schooling with the knowledge and skills they need for success in life beyond school. The literacy and numeracy requirements can be met through a range of options. It is important when planning your senior subjects (and throughout your senior studies) that you know and understand the QCE literacy and numeracy requirements and that you choose subjects correctly.

The most common way to meet the literacy standards is by studying QCAA General or Applied English subjects for Unit 1, Unit 2, or a Unit 3 and 4 pair. These subjects include English, English and Literature Extension, English as an Additional Language, Literature and/or Essential English. <u>Click here</u> to see other Literacy options including International Baccalaureate.

The most common way to meet the numeracy standards is by studying QCAA General or Applied Mathematics subjects for Unit 1, Unit 2, or a Unit 3 and 4 pair. Study Skills Checklist

We all learn differently and we each have our own style of studying. To get the most out of your studying, it's important to better understand what works for you and what doesn't. To get started, Education Corner recommends printing out their study skills checklist, read each statement and decide if it applies to you. If it does, tick Y. If it doesn't, tick N. The purpose of this checklist is to provide you a basic self-assessment of your study habits and attitudes, so you can identify study skills areas where you might want to focus on improving. It may give you some light bulb moments and could be the beginning of better study habits. Talk with your Guidance Officer/School Counsellor if you need some support, tips and/or strategies.

Take care of yourself

Your brain and body are closely connected. Looking after your body has great benefits for your mind. Activities like sport, dance, walking or yoga can increase your performance by increasing oxygen to your brain. It's also great at reducing tension from stress and school pressure.

Some stress can be useful in keeping us motivated – without it we would find it hard to stay awake! However, during Year 12 and especially during exam time, you may find your stress levels rising high into the 'critical zone', causing a dramatic decline in performance. Proven strategies for beating stress include:

- Relaxation: smartphone apps like <u>Smiling Mind</u> can help
- Time management: try making a list of activities and prioritise
- Connecting with others: talk about your worries, laugh, be positive!
- Remember to be kind to yourself: take some time out to do the things you enjoy or help you maintain your wellbeing

Not sure what the terms mean?

ACU have put together some information about terms you will see when you are researching and applying for tertiary entry in 2026. The definitions are appropriate in the majority of cases across all universities. Click <u>here</u> to find commonly used terms and their definitions some of which are:

- Undergraduate When you start uni, you are an undergraduate student working towards your bachelor or associate degree.
- Unit or course A subject within a program or course. Each subject or unit has a specified number of credit points that count towards a degree.
- Selection rank This is a ranking used to assess your admission to a course. Your course selection
 rank can include your ATAR, any adjustment factors you might be eligible for and any other
 contributions such as, VET qualifications or STAT results.

Scoring and marking UCAT (University Clinical Aptitude Test)

The UCAT ANZ was established to help some universities achieve greater fairness in selection into medicine, dentistry and clinical sciences. The UCAT is marked on the number of correct answers you give. Your performance on one question does not influence which other questions are presented. As the number of questions varies between the three cognitive subtests, it is not possible to make a direct comparison of the raw marks between these subtests. Raw marks are therefore converted to scale scores that share a common range from 300 to 900. A total scale score is generated by summing the individual scale scores in the subtests of Verbal Reasoning, Decision Making and Quantitative Reasoning. The total scaled score ranges from 900 to 2700.

Your substantial judgement measures your capacity to understand real world situations and to identify critical factors and appropriate behaviour in dealing with them. There are 69 questions in this section and the scale score range is 300 - 900. <u>Click here</u> to read more about this process on the UCAT ANZ website.
