Educational Access Scheme (EAS) for QTAC applicants

Students with a disability are strongly encouraged to apply for the Educational Access Scheme (EAS) when applying for tertiary courses through QTAC. You may be eligible to receive Adjustment Factors that will improve your chance of receiving a course offer. It is not too late to apply for EAS if you have already put in your QTAC application. Visit the [Educational Access Scheme](#) on the QTAC website to download the relevant cover sheet (or sheets). Complete the cover sheet and upload your supporting documents to your QTAC application (by going to 'Outstanding Documents'). The final date to submit your EAS application for the offer-rounds on 23 December 2025 is 8 December and for 15 January 2026, 8 December 2025. Visit the Key dates [page](#) for offer round dates. QTAC recommends that current Year 12 students submit their application by the end of October, so additional information can be accessed from your school if necessary.

ATAR Portal registration

Have you registered on the ATAR portal to have your ATAR calculated by QTAC? Remember, when registering for the ATAR portal, **you must use your personal email address**. If you have registered using your school email address, now is the time to change it to your personal email address. This will ensure you won't get locked out of your account once you graduate. To update your email address, log into the ATAR portal and update via the portal. If you have forgotten your password, you need to call QTAC on 1300 467 822. How to Respond to an offer

Visit the QTAC Offers webpage for specific information about responding to your offer. It's important to understand how you'll be notified and how to respond quickly to secure your place. It's important to know what options are available to you and how you will respond if you receive an offer. Click [here](#) to find out more including:

 - Accept - Check with the institution for enrolment details and dates
 - Conditional response - By selecting a conditional response, you indicate that you would like to be considered for a higher preference
 - Defer - Rules for course deferral vary by institution. Visit their deferment page on their website for individual [institution policies](#)
 - Decline - By declining your offer outright, you notify QTAC that you no longer wish to study or be considered for any other preferences.
 - What to do if you didn't get an offer

It is essential that you respond by the due date (usually within four (4) days of receiving your offer). If you don't, your offer will lapse and you will not be considered for any other offer rounds. If you miss a due date, contact QTAC as soon as possible. Also, it may not be wise to reject an offer. If you are considering doing this, first contact QTAC on 1300 467 822 to discuss this move.

Keep an eye on your QTAC application

Once you've submitted your QTAC application, it's super important to **log in regularly** to keep everything on track. Here's what you can do when you check in:

Update your contact details – If you need to change your name, date of birth, citizenship status, gender, Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander, Māori, Pasifika or Australian South Sea Islander status, or qualification details, call QTAC on **1300 467 822**.

Check for messages – See if QTAC has sent you any updates or requests about your application.

Make sure you meet entry requirements – Double-check you’ve got everything covered.

Upload any extra documents – Make sure you’ve submitted everything they’ve asked for.

Check regularly if you’ve received an offer – You don’t want to miss out!

Look through the Q&A section – This can help clear up common questions.

QTAC usually contacts you using the **email address you used in your application**. Make sure this is your **personal email**, not your school one.

📧 **Get into the habit of checking your emails often**, including your Junk folder. An easy trick is to **link your email to your smartphone**, so you don’t miss anything important.

Getting into uni with an **ATAR** is super common, but it’s **not the only way** to get where you want to go.

Rural Access Scheme (RAS)

The Rural Access Scheme (RAS) is for students who have lived in rural and remote areas for five years consecutively or ten years cumulatively across any period in their lifetime. The RAS could see you benefit from a rank adjustment or a designated rural and remote quota place. Rural/remote status is determined by the Modified Monash Model (MM) category 2- 7. Check your address [here](#). A school letter is the best evidence of rural residence.

Some QTAC Q&As

? I applied for the Educational Access Scheme (EAS) when I applied to QTAC. What do I need to do now?

If you didn't download the **EAS cover sheet** for the category (or categories) you applied for, head to the **EAS info section** on the QTAC [website](#), scroll down, and click on your category. The cover sheet tells you exactly which documents you need to give QTAC — and they must be submitted by the **key dates**. 📄

? I didn't apply for EAS when I applied to QTAC. Can I still apply?

Yep, you can! 🙌

- Log back into your QTAC application and apply for EAS.
- Download the relevant cover sheet(s) from the **Assistance Scheme** page (scroll down).
- Follow the instructions on the cover sheet carefully.
- Attach your supporting documents by uploading them to your application or posting them to QTAC.

Some categories might also need a **school statement**, so make sure you check. QTAC recommends Year 12 students get their EAS applications in **by the end of October**.

? I'm confused about offer rounds as there are lots of offer rounds on the QTAC site. I heard I could get an earlier offer?

You're not alone — this part can be tricky. 😊

Unis can make offers **earlier than the major offer round**, as long as you've met all entry requirements. Check the **Course Offer Dates** page on the QTAC website for when different unis might make their offers.

QTAC will let you know about offers by **email**, so make sure you're checking it regularly — including your **Junk/Spam folder**.

 **Important:** If you get an offer, you usually have **only a few days (often 4)** to respond. If you don't, the offer expires and you won't be considered for future rounds.

? I applied for a course that needs an audition but didn't do the audition. Will I still be considered?

You'll need to contact the uni directly, but the answer will probably be **no**.

If an audition is part of the entry requirements, not doing it usually means you won't be considered. 

? I don't know what my ATAR will be. My pathway preferences (5 and 6) need a minimum ATAR of 78. Is that a safe back-up?

Not really. 

It's smarter to pick **at least one "safety net" course** (especially your 6th preference) where **everyone who applied last year got an offer**.

The good news? You can change your preferences **after you get your ATAR**, so you'll have a chance to adjust and keep your options open. 

? Where can I get help with my QTAC application after I leave school?

Once school's done, the best place to get help is **QTAC itself**.

You can:

-  Call QTAC on **1300 467 822** (be patient — it's a busy time, and you might have to wait)
-  Use the **Contact Us** page on the QTAC website
-  Or email them if you prefer

The Educational Access Scheme (EAS) reminder

If you have been negatively impacted by circumstances beyond your control, Educational Access Scheme (EAS) may assist you in reaching your study dreams with rank adjustments. You might think of the obvious factors impacting your students like financial hardship, illness or disabilities, however, EAS may also help in times of natural disasters. USI: You will need one!

The USI (Unique Student Identifier) is a student's individual education number for life. You need a USI if you are:

- graduating Year 12 and wanting to apply to tertiary institutions

- undertaking Nationally Recognised Training (e.g. VET qualifications)
- a higher education student seeking Commonwealth financial assistance (e.g. a HECS-HELP loan)
- an international student studying onshore in Australia

Australian school students need to create a USI before they apply for tertiary study. There is no minimum age requirement to create a USI. Find out more about the USI on the Australian Government [website](#).

Busting Some Common Uni Myths

✗ “First year doesn’t count.”

Not true.

Your first-year results usually count towards your GPA (Grade Point Average) — and your GPA matters.

- Employers often look at it when you graduate.
- If you want to transfer into a different course, a strong GPA can help.
- Many scholarships are based on your GPA once you start uni.

So yes, first year *does* count — don’t slack off!

✗ “I’ll be paying off my HECS-HELP debt forever.”

Also not true.

The HECS-HELP loan helps you pay your student contribution for your course. You don’t start paying it back until you’re earning over \$67,000

- Repayments are made through the tax system, not all at once.
- There’s no interest, but your balance is indexed each year to match inflation.

So, it’s more like a slow, income-based repayment rather than a scary lifelong debt. For the latest info, check out Commonwealth Supported Places and HECS-HELP.

✗ “I’ll never find a job after graduation.”

Competition for jobs is real — but you can totally give yourself an edge.

Start getting experience while you study. Do some work experience, internships, or part-time jobs in your field. This looks great on your résumé and helps employers see what you can do.

Don’t wait until your final year — check out your uni’s Careers and Employment services early on. They can help with jobs, networking and internships.

✗ “If I don’t make friends during O Week, I never will.”

Nope! O Week (Orientation Week) is awesome for meeting people and learning about support services — but it’s not your *only* chance to make friends. You’ll meet people in tutorials, group projects, clubs, societies, and even the coffee line. If you’re shy, joining a club is a great way to meet people without the awkward small talk.

🙄 “Lectures can be skipped.”

Yes... and no.

Most lectures are recorded, so technically you *can* skip. However, turning up has some solid perks:

- Some courses count attendance as part of your grade.
- You’re paying to be there — you might as well get the most out of it.
- It’s a chance to make friends and build good connections with lecturers. Those connections can really help when you’re job hunting later.

Offer guarantee/VET guarantee for Semester 1 offers

QUT's [offer guarantee and VET guarantee](#) provides certainty to students if they meet the offer guarantee ATAR or selection rank, or have the required VET qualification, they are guaranteed an offer in the course, regardless of the course threshold. The offer guarantee and VET guarantee applies to Semester 1, 2026 offers. If you are considering taking a break after Year 12, they recommend you apply for the course now and defer your course offer to commence the following year. Deferment of two years, or six or 18 months (if the course has a mid-year offering), is also available on request.

Quick Q&A

Can a student who is eligible for a QUT bachelor degree choose a QUT diploma pathway if they want more support or are not as confident?

Yes, absolutely. Read more about the [QUT College environment and support](#).

Are QUT diplomas and the undergraduate certificate (nursing) offered as Commonwealth Supported Places (CSP)?

If an Indigenous Australian student applies for QUT via QTAC, what is the process for the Oodgeroo Unit to consider their application?

Yes, If a student identifies as Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander on their QTAC application and includes a QUT course in their top three preferences, the [Oodgeroo Unit](#) will contact them to invite them to participate in the [Centralised Assessment and Selection Process](#) (CASP).

For scholarships that are for students struggling financially, is there a specific income associated with this?

Year 12 Early Offer Scheme—upcoming key dates

For Queensland high school students, the [Year 12 Early Offer Scheme](#) can provide certainty about their future options, with an offer to study at QUT on their last day of Year 12. More than 80 single and double degrees are included in the scheme. Important dates include:

- 22 October: final date for students to complete their QTAC application with an eligible QUT course listed in their top three preferences to be considered for an early offer invitation.
- 5 November: early offer round one final date to submit supporting documentation.
- 14 November: round one students who are approved for an early offer receive email notification.
- 18 November: final date to reorder preferences to ensure an eligible course is listed as their first QTAC preference.
